A skilled communicator and problem solver, Doreen brings a diversified background in corporate and educational environments. She holds a BA in Employment Relations from Michigan State University (1987) and a Master of Education from DePaul University (1996), with honors.

Doreen began her career with MCI Communications in 1990, working in her hometown of Grand Rapids, Michigan, and also in the Chicago area. She won top awards for revenue growth, customer retention and account management. In

1998, she accepted a new challenge at US Xchange, a start-up communications company. There, she designed a customer retention program, and built and managed a service

team, across a three state region. Two years later, Doreen accepted an opportunity in marketing for Philip Morris USA, where she served as a mentor, and implemented national brand strategies.

Doreen relocated to Arkansas with her husband George in 2001 when he accepted a position as an Aquaculture Extension Specialist for the northeast region of the state. She put her education degree to use as an adjunct instructor for ASU's Newport campus, teaching classes in Language Arts, Writing Development,

Education, and First Year Studies. In the early part of that decade, the Seldens established a family, as Doreen gave birth to sons Thomas and William.

Student Overcame Speech Disorder to Achieve Broadcasting Dream

Almost 13 million listeners across the U.S tune in Morning Edition each morning, giving the NPR news magazine the larg-

est audience of any radio news program. If you're one of the several thousand who receive Morning Edition from KASU, you'll notice seamless transitions between the voices of NPR newscasters, such as Giles Snyder and Steve Inskeep, and the local news segments delivered by Johnathan Reaves.

Johnathan's smooth voice and Midwest accent have served him well in a broadcasting career that required him to overcome obstacles. After he spent child-hood years in Minot, North Dakota, Johnathan's Air Force family moved to Eaker Air Base near Gosnell, Arkansas. Johnathan was lucky enough to attend Gosnell High School, one of the first in Arkansas to offer a broadcasting curriculum "I took a radio course during my senior year (1992), just because I thought it would be an easy credit" he said. "Little did I know that I would become so passionate about broadcasting."

"When I first told my dad that I wanted to be an announcer, he said 'Son, I love you — so I hate to tell you this – but you'll never make it in that field.' He was referring to my childhood speech disorder. So I started doing speech therapy with some good pathologists. Then, I was lucky enough to have a very patient and helpful boss, Bob Abel, at my first radio station".

In 1993, Reaves started working at KOSE radio in Osceola

while he was earning his associate's degree at Blytheville's community college. Then he majored in radio-television at ASU-

Jonesboro, emphasizing news and graduating in 1996. While in college, he worked part time at KASU and did voice-over work at KAIT Channel 8 in Jonesboro.

After earning his degree, Reaves worked in Stuttgart, Arkansas for 16 years as news director at KWAK-AM/FM and other Arkansas County Broadcasters stations owned by Bobby Caldwell. He gained so much respect in that community that he was appointed to serve an unexpired term on the Stuttgart City Council and became the voice of Stuttgart Schools on the systems' welcoming voicemail.

In October 2011, Johnathan accepted the position at KASU that was vacated when Mark Smith moved over to become the station's development specialist. Reaves is excited to be back at KASU, where he produces segments for Morning Edition, the KASU web site,

and KASU Community Calendar both on-air and on-line.

He said "What I enjoy most about this job is meeting new people and putting their stories on the air. I enjoy interviewing people and finding out what issues are affecting people the most and how they are being affected; it is the essential part of radio news."

Reaves and his wife, Jennifer, have one daughter, Emily. Johnathan's parents, Calvin and Karen Reaves of Blytheville, are very proud of his accomplishments.
